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## Dr Adrian Peel (68), Lancashire

Retired pharmacologist Dr Adrian Peel was at his computer when he felt a bit odd. Then he realised that something was wrong with his vision as the right hand side of the screen had “disappeared”.

Dr Peel had suffered a stroke – the only side effect was partial sight loss. When he was seen the following day by a stroke consultant he was told there no available treatment and it was unlikely there would be any improvement to his sight.

Dr Peel was struggling to read, unable to drive and found walking along the pavement or crossing the road tricky because his vision made it difficult to judge the traffic. He was given a white cane.

Around two months after his stroke, Dr Peel’s eyes had “steadied” and although his vision was not any better he was able to surf the web for possible treatments and that is when came across the University of Aberdeen therapy.

Once the equipment for the Neuro-Eye Therapy arrived Dr Peel began treatment.
